Jolly Boys visit to Leicester 1/3/07

On first impressions, Leicester is a resolutely modern city, but further inspection reveals traces of its medieval and Roman past. The Romans choosing the site, near the river Soar, in the middle of the rebellious Coritani developed Leicester's precursor, Ratae Coritanorum, as a fortified town on the Fosse Way Subsequently, in the eighth century, the Danes colonised the town and later still its medieval castle became the seat of the earls of Leicester. Since the late seventeenth century, Leicester has been a centre of the hosiery trade and it was this industry that attracted hundreds of Asian immigrants to settle here in the 1950/60s. Today about one third of Leicester's population is Asian.

All pubs are in the station area so no buses, and not too much walking.

There is a Weatherspoons (The last Plantagenet), for early birds, in Granby St, (turn right out of the station and straight on using the underpass)
