

JOLLY BOYS DAY OUT IN CENTRAL BIRMINGHAM

In 1538 geographer John Leland described Birmingham as a good market town with many Smiths making knives and other cutting tools. It was transformed by the industrial revolution into one of the great industrial cities of the world by people like Matthew Boulton of the Soho foundry circa 1796, James Watt and William Murdock inventor of gas lighting. Although long before that during the Civil War the skills were already there when 15,000 swords were made locally so that the Cromwellian and Royalist forces could kill one another. In modern times Birmingham has built a new reputation on the arts and has transformed the city centre. It also has more miles of canal than Venice. This tour is concentrated in the centre within easy walking distance of New Street Station.
