JOLLY BOYS' VISIT TO CHESTERFIELD – THURSDAY 1ST APRIL 2010

HISTORY

Chesterfield in Derbyshire, England, with its crooked spire, is Derbyshire's second largest town. It is surrounded by some of the loveliest and unspoilt countryside in the county. It is built over a Roman site which is also on top of an Iron Age fort. The Romans probably settled here because the area is so rich in natural minerals like coal, lead and tin. In Domesday, the town was known as Cestrefeld meaning open field, and its early prosperity was largely a result of its role as a market town, which served the whole of the north east of Derbyshire. The market still remains an important part of the town's economy.

The 19th century saw Chesterfield developing rapidly into an industrial centre, especially with the coming of the railway. It was George Stevenson who supervised the construction of the Midland Line through the town, as he had done earlier with other Derbyshire towns.

Nearby is a part of the town known as the Shambles which originally dates back to the 12th century. The shamble's narrow streets are both quaint and home to good shops, tea rooms and an interesting timber framed pub called the Royal Oak. A sign outside, records the fact that a pub has been sited here since 1772 and before that a rest house for ' the knights templar, a band of crusaders'.

It is also the home of the world's best football club (probably).

To get to the Spa Lane Vaults go up the hill and over the pedestrian bridge (which is over the ring road). Carry on past the Theatre and Museum. Bear left and carry on with the Crooked Spire on your right. About 5 minutes walk.

The station is about 15 minutes walk from the Portland. There is only a very irregular bus service from the town centre to the station.

* There is a railway connection with the Portland Hotel. It was built as the Railway Hotel for the Lancashire, Derbyshire and East Coast Railway whose terminus was just across the road (long disappeared). The railway is famous for the fact it reached neither Lancashire nor the East Coast!
