

### Jolly Boys Outing. Norwich . 10<sup>th</sup> May 2012

A return trip to one of the Jolly Boys most popular Real Ale venues. Previous visits being Oct. 1997, Jan. 2001, Oct . 2003, Oct. 2006, Jan. 2009.

This tour, which is planned to proceed in a clockwise direction from the Station, includes 3 Pubs not visited on any of the previous visits, and crosses the River Wensum twice, each time on the two most recently opened footbridges.

**Woodforde's Wherry, Norfolk, Norg**

Grade II-listed building, parts of which date from the 15th century, at the north end of Norwich's historic Tombland. It opened under its present name in 2004 (it was previously The Louis Marches). It has the feel of a continental café bar to it, especially at lunchtime, providing home-cooked food. A range of around four real ales is available, including Woodforde's and guests, often from local brewers. There is also a selection of bottled beers plus real cider. Norwich's smallest pub, reopened in 2008. This former cottage/Oakham house serves quality ales and traditional fish chaps to boot. Located just off the market place, the restaurant is upstairs, although some customers prefer to eat downstairs in the garden in summer tables and chairs are set out in the pedestrianised street where customers can while away their time watching shoppers go by. Popular city-centre free house in Norwich's main shopping area and close to the castle. In addition to its regular ales there is always a large range of guests, many of which come from local micro. The interior contains a number of drinking areas on split levels and there are wide-screen TVs for live sports. The pub also incorporates the adjacent Murderers Café Bar, which provides an extra room that can be booked for private functions. Renowned, friendly, 17th-century free house with a spacious outside patio immediately opposite the Bishop's Palace and with views of Norwich Cathedral. Three permanent ales and three guests are always available, usually including at least two local beers. The small back room can be used for meetings. Major sporting events are shown on a large-screen TV.
