# JBs Excursion to Winchester on Thursday 12th April And a load of old bollards

Winchester Hants, well above high tide level at 200ft, is 60.273 miles from London by crow, 113 miles from Wickford, 281 miles from Wakefield and 3,757 miles by long distance carrier pigeon from its name sake in Virginia USA with which it is paired.

Useful travel information to Winchester: From Aberdeen, 05 46 and change at Edinburgh, Wolverhampton, and Basingstoke to arrive at 15 36. Fares from Wickford: Advance Standard £14; Normal Standard £44; Normal First £67.80 and return £128.80. Or by bus travel from Wickford Swans at 04 55 on the X10 changing at Stansted and Heathrow airports to arrive The Broadway at 09 40. Unfortunately, too early for bus passes!

Otherwise JBs are regarded as being capable of finding their own way there and back.

## Start, as has become tradition by reception in the Wetherspoons

1 The Old Gaolhouse: 11 Jewry Street SO23 8RZ to 10 55

Option here, both of which open at 11am, is:

2a The Old Vine: 8 Great Minster Street SO23 9NP 11 05 to 11 45

2b The Eclipse Inn: The Square SO23 9EX 11 05 to 11 45

This very small pub will only contain a very limited number of JBs so if raining you may have to draw lots as to who stays inside.

On the way down to the Crown and Anchor, turn down a passage at the sign board to pass the Baker's Arms. You will not find it if you try from the High Street, we do not stop here either

4 The Black Boy: 1 Wharf Hill SO23 9NP 12 40 to whenever

5a The Wykeham Arms: 75 Kingsgate Street SO23 9PE whenever to ??

Or for those wanting a shorter journey back the Royal Oak, passage is opposite to St Thomas's Street

5b The Royal Oak: Royal Oak Passage S023 9AU

If still thirsty there is still the Albion on the approach to the Winchester "Train" Station post code of the latter which may be required by this time is SO23 8TJ

The Crown and Anchor seems to have a reasonable menu but the primary suggestion is the black boy for lunch.

On the recce all the above had an acceptable, but not large, range of beers, the Old Vine for example had Landlord, Gold Muddler, Flack Catcher and a Long Dog beer.

#### Bollards

From outside the Old Vine right down to the William Walker [which we walk past and do not tarry,] the cultural part of the visit is the art gallery of old masters presented right before you.

"Winchester City Council funded the painting of a total of 16 bollards as part of its wider contribution to the refurbishment of The Square in partnership with Hampshire County Council. The bollard project, first conceived in 2005 as part of the Hat Fair celebrations, is thought to have been a first for the UK, following in the footsteps of similar schemes in Australia, the USA and Europe. The team at <a href="The Colour Factory">The Colour Factory</a>, which includes principal artists Jenny Muncaster and Rachael Alexander, took inspiration from some of the world's greatest painters, adding an extra splash of artistic integrity, fun and intrigue to the city's street furniture."
